STRATEGIC ISSUES

The importance of integrating Sevan issues into other sectoral strategies and processes

The need for an effective mechanism of legal and political implementation and intersectoral coordination aimed at supporting monitoring

AGREEMENTS

- The current level of cooperation and coordination is insufficient and needs improving.
- The expert commission and other existing mechanisms are not sufficient for ensuring efficient coordination.
- There is a need for an intersectoral coordination and cooperation body which will be important to stipulate in the amended version of the Law on Lake Sevan.

AGREEMENTS

- The coordination body should be established at the highest level. It should be determined and efficient and should have a clear scope of responsibility.
- Sectoral ministries, agencies, communities, the regional administration, scientific institutions, NGOs, and private institutions should be a part in the body/council.
- Decisions made by the body/council should be evidence-based. The council should have a monitoring and evaluation system.

- Scoping of the legal, policy, and institutional framework on the Lake Sevan ecosystem governance
- Lake Sevan National Vision 2050
- Lake Sevan Ecosystem Restoration Strategy
- Amendment of the Law of the RA on Lake Sevan
- "Sevan" National Park Management Plan
- A comprehensive impact assessment of the water level increase in Lake Sevan
